



## Footballers call foul play on Burrs field

**The continuing problem of dog fouling has reared its ugly head once again.**

Dogs are prohibited from the Burrs Playing Field and there are notices to this effect at both entrances. The Parish Council's amenity sweeper currently cleans up three times a week. Children's football teams use the field and they have to clear faeces from the pitch themselves before each match.

Dog fouling can lead to toxocarasis in humans which causes serious illness and blindness. It is simply not

acceptable in places where children play.

Dogs can be walked along the river, either to the east alongside BAE Systems, or west towards Crabley Creek through the public right of way past the yacht club.

One very concerned resident is upset over the amount of fouling in the villages, particularly on the pathways around the new housing estates. She said: "My toddler often steps in the mess which is all over the pathways – it is difficult to avoid. With summer

on its way this seriously needs to be addressed. Our children's health is at risk!" Her young daughter fouled her first pair of shoes stepping in dog dirt on two separate occasions.

Although it is only a minority of dog walkers who are causing a nuisance, they should be aware that it is not only antisocial and irresponsible but it is also a criminal offence to leave your dog's faeces lying around in a public area. Being unaware that your dog has fouled is not an excuse. You could still be fined up to £1000.

## A little bit of action on Wednesday afternoon goes a long way

**The Brough Voluntary Action (BVA) Welcome Club continues on the second and fourth Wednesday afternoon of each month. Their informal meetings provide a great opportunity for people to join in with friends for bingo and refreshments or just to chat and catch up with each other.**

In addition to the Welcome Club, BVA volunteers use their own cars to transport clients to doctors' surgeries, hospitals or to do shopping in and around the villages. There is currently a group of around forty volunteers, who each give a little of their time to help the mainly older and less mobile members of the community to maintain their independence.

Since being established in 1993, Brough Voluntary Action has very much appreciated the support of its sponsors, which include BAE Systems, the Brough Golf Club's Captain's Charity, the United Reformed Church and the Parish Council.

For the last two years, they have also been helped by teams of youngsters taking part in the annual Lifestyle project. In 2008 the Brough Gadgets and in 2009 the Fearless Three all assisted in Brough Voluntary Action activities, helping to raise significant funds towards meeting the essential operating costs. BVA look forward to receiving help from similar teams in the future, as their youthful enthusiasm has been a welcome breath of fresh air to the attendees and volunteers alike.

## NEWS·IN·BRIEF

▶ Brough School is the only school in the East Riding unable to accommodate all children from its school's catchment area this year. Ten applicants have been allocated places at other schools. Changes to the catchment area are being discussed, and ERYC is working to establish whether the problems are the start of a new trend or a one-off occurrence.

▶ **As Spring arrives, ERYC is reminding residents to recycle old catalogues. Paper backed catalogues can be placed in the blue bins or paper banks. Hardbacked volumes such as the *Next Directory* should have covers removed. Covers can then be placed in the cardboard skip at waste recycling sites. An estimated 300,000 catalogues are thrown away every year in the county.**

▶ Creative writing group South Cave Writers will mark the 350th anniversary of Samuel Pepys famous diaries with an evening of readings of their work penned for the occasion. *Time and Tide* will be staged at the Half Moon Inn, Elloughton on 21st June, the longest day of the year.

▶ **The Ferry Inn, Brough underwent extensive refurbishment in March. The work represents a £100,000 investment by owners Marstons Inns. Regulars hope this indicates a renewed commitment to the 400 year old historic pub. Just two years ago the pub's future was uncertain amidst rumours of imminent closure**

▶ Following the success of the initial taster sessions in February, organisers of Creative Space are continuing to run weekly craft sessions at the Community Centre every Thursday in term time. The two hour sessions start at 1pm. A nominal charge of £2 is made towards room hire and materials. ## Elloughton-cum-Brough Scouts celebrate centenary

**Elloughton-cum-Brough Scout Group celebrates its centenary this year. The village Scout troop was inaugurated on 17th November 1910. To mark 100 years of Scouting in Brough and Elloughton a navy blue trim has been added to the group's traditional red neckerchief, and the Scouting Association has granted permission for two specially designed badges to be worn on uniforms.**

Perhaps one of our most auspicious boy scouts was Arthur Higham for whom Higham Way off Welton Road is named. Along with his father,

Arthur helped to rescue two survivors of the infamous R38 airship which crashed into the Humber on a test flight on 21st July 1917. For his bravery Arthur received the Cornwell Scout Badge for great courage and endurance, one of Scouting's most prestigious awards. He also won the Royal Humane Society Bronze Medal.

In addition to an open evening held in March, a number of further events will be held to celebrate the centenary. A group camp is planned in September which will involve the Beaver Colony and Cub Pack, as well as the Scout Troop and Explorers – some 100 or so children, young people and adult leaders in total.

A thanksgiving service will be held later in the year on 20th November. Anyone who has been involved in Scouting in the villages over the years is invited to attend.

## POLICE REPORT

In October last year the Haltemprice Neighbourhood Policing Team took part in the "Not In My Neighbourhood Week" – a national drive to demonstrate the different types of work that local Police teams are involved with. Staff had the opportunity to get out and about in their neighbourhoods and engage in a number of activities including high visibility patrols, the arresting of outstanding offenders, public consultations and clamping down on speeding. Officers spoke to many residents to establish the level of awareness about Neighbourhood Policing. The survey results were revealing and thanks go to all who took part and contributed.

### Antisocial Behaviour

The team already has a patrolling system which effectively tackles anti social behaviour. Staff move around to ensure support is available at peak times. Officers have seized and destroyed hundreds of alcoholic items from young people over the last year. Access to alcohol is directly related to anti social behaviour, criminal damage and low level violence.

### Speeding

Survey results show that further enforcement is required and this will be carried out imminently. In a 45 minute period five vehicles on Welton Road, Brough were seen speeding with an average speed of 33mph in a 30mph zone. On Cave Road, Brough 13 vehicles were speeding with an average speed of 44.5mph in a 40mph zone.

The East Riding of Yorkshire

Council plan to introduce a scheme where local residents can help out by undertaking Speed Watch patrols. This requires a small degree of training and use of technical equipment. Speed is major cause of collisions and injuries.

### Police Contact

People who spoke to officers reported differing experiences. The Police will be working hard in the future to ensure that communities receive the best possible service. Residents are encouraged to get to know their local police officers and PCSOs and use them for any enquiries, either about criminal activity or general queries. They are there to help you.

### Residents' Concerns

Almost a third of residents who had contact with the Police rated the level of service as "good", with over half rating it as "fair". Of those questioned 14% had not had any contact.

Almost half of the residents had been affected by anti social behaviour, so it is not surprising that the main concern reported (30%) is with youths causing annoyance. Other causes for concern among residents were reported as theft, burglary, under age drinking and car racing. Problem parking was also cited.
