NEWS·IN·BRIEF

▶ Brough and South Cave Medical Practice is holding drop-in sessions for flu vaccinations. Appointments are not necessary for registered patients. Sessions will take place between 1.30pm and 5.30pm on Wed 8th and Thu 23rd Oct and Tue 11th Nov in Brough, and Tue 14th and Wed 29th Oct in South Cave. Eligible patients include those over 65 or in an at risk group, and children between the age of 2 and 4 years.

▶ **The newly built Welcome Centre at Brough Methodist Church opened officially on Saturday 27th September. A buffet lunch was served followed by a short service. Local residents are invited to an open day and annual craft fair on Saturday 4th October from 10.00am to 4.00pm. Entry is free and refreshments will be available. Tables are £10 each and may be booked by ringing Linda on 666322.**

▶ Phase 3 of the CCTV installation at the Village Hall on Elloughton Road has now been completed with the installation of a number plate recognition camera. This has been funded by The Police Commissioner's Crime Reduction Fund. Phases 1 and 2 were funded by Elloughton-cum-Brough Town Council and East Riding of Yorkshire Proceeds of Crime Fund. The CCTV has full coverage of the area around the village hall. Some of the cameras have zoom capability.

▶ **East Riding of Yorkshire Council is promoting its YORSwitch campaign which aims to help residents, especially vulnerable people, and businesses get cheaper gas and electricity bills. ▶ Free NHS health checks are on offer to people between 40 and 74 years across the East Riding. Brough surgery is taking part in the scheme. The checks assess a person's risk of developing diabetes, heart disease, kidney disease, stroke and dementia.


Laughing matters for local children's poet


Join the WI? Why not?
